Students on the Trinidad State Junior College robotics team fared remarkably well in the 4th Annual Colorado Robot Challenge last Saturday at the Great Sand Dunes National Park east of Alamosa.

Their robot invention made it through the first course and advanced to the second course, along with the team from Colorado State University at Fort Collins. Neither team could then get through the second course, but were allowed to try out their robots on other courses. No other teams made it through

"I was very proud of the team," said project leader Cindy Clements. Everyone was impressed with the TSJC robot and "Ours was the most unique," Clements added.

City receives more bad sales tax news, but help may be on way

The Trinidad area economy took another big hit in February with City Manager Jim Soltis reporting at Tuesday's City Council work session that February sales tax revenues were down a whopping 12.3 percent following January's 11.1 percent

He said that means city sales tax revenues are already off \$90,000 from a comparable twomonth period in 2009 when the local and national recession was already in full swing.

Despite the city and county's moribund economy, Nancy Lackey, Trinidad-Las Animas County Economic Development board president, told council that ED and its ongoing partnerships with South Central Council of Governments, Trinidad State Junior College and TLAC Chamber of Commerce, were taking a much more pro-active approach to try and make the city as attractive as possible for relocating or new small businesses to open up shop here.

"I feel Trinidad is entering into a new economy. We are starting to approach more businesses to give them information on how they might fit into our community rather than wait for them to come to us," said Lackey. But she told council that the lack of suitable land, new or existing building accommodations, a well-trained workforce and infrastructure will keep any large international com-

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Treasurer, sheriff, county commissioner contested

With both the Republican and Democratic assemblies now in the books, it is now known who will vie for Las Animas County treasurer, sheriff and county commissioner in District Three.

The race for Las Animas County Commissioner District Three will be full on the Democratic side. Both John Rino and Anthony Mattie received enough votes at the Democratic assembly. Mattie received 95 and Rino took home 77. Both did gain enough delegate votes to continue on to the Democratic primary.

Trinidad City of Councilwomen Linda Velasquez will run by a petition for the District Three seat.

In August, all three will face off at the Democratic Primary.

Mack Louden two weeks ago was officially nominated by the Las Animas County Republican Party to represent the party against the Democratic nominee in the November election.

The seat for Las Animas County Treasurer will also be a hotly contested race. Donna Leonetti, who was appointed by the Las Animas County Board of Commissioners after Anthony Abeyta retired, will go up against current Commissioner Jim Montoya, who after two terms and being term limited will leave his seat at the end of the year to run for treasurer.

Leonetti received 113 delegate votes while Montoya maintained

Both treasurer candidates will now head to the fall primary.

Gary Terry will run unopposed once again for the county surveyor seat.

Dominic Verquer will run for the open seat of county coroner. Verquer works for the Trinidad Ambulance District.

Las Animas County Sheriff James Casias won the approval of the Democratic delegates and will now face Trinidad Policeman Archie Vigil in the fall. Vigil will run by petition. Casias is the incumbent.

Incumbents Dan Espinoza (Las Animas County Assessor), and Bernie Gonzales (Las Animas County Clerk), both ran unopposed and will remain in their positions for another term.

No prizes were handed out, but a NASA representative informed Clements and her team that TSJC would again be funded for next year's Challenge. NASA gave TSJC \$2.500 for this vear's Challenge and the representative said the funding would be at least that much for next year.

This was the first time that TSJC participated in Colorado State University participating.

Clements said she was surprised at the number of robots that were dead on arrival. At least a couple of the robots, when set down for action, simply did not budge.

Team member Jeremy Begley said it was a great experience and that just because TSJC is a two-year school it doesn't mean that its students aren't capable of doing just as well if not better than those from the four-year schools.

"I learned that these guys worked hard," said Earl Nesbitt, retired electri-

> cal engineer and adjunct math professor at TSJC who added his expertise to the project.

Just seeing how it all worked together for a successful result was what team member Matt Barela said he got out of the Challenge. He drew up the original design for the robot. "We were right there at the top, especially considering some of the other schools, like Denver Mines and their reputation. I think we did pretty well,"

Barela added.

Programmer Paul Philbin said that when he started, he didn't know anything at all about programming, but the project afforded him the opportunity to learn the Basic programming language.

Laura Mourer, who was in charge of keeping track of all the data, while taking photos and recording everything, said she learned that to be successful, a lot of time has to go into the project. "If you have a good

team, things go very well, as in this case," Mourer said. Next year, she'll be pursuing her education further at CSU-Pueblo.

Mourer also pointed out something that occurred to her at the Challenge – the lack of women on other teams. One other team had one woman, while the TSJC team had five women involved.

Clements says she is now looking to start a new team, with all the current team members moving on. "We

started from scratch this year too," Clements said. She added that work on the next Challenge will begin earlier, as in September, rather than January, when work began on this year's

Challenge. The irony of it all is that team members Barela, Begley and Philbin all plan on attending CSU at Fort Collins next year, where they will join the robotics team and go up against their alma mater in the 2011 Challenge.

NOAA's National Weather Service in Pueblo, Colorado is looking for citizens who would like to volunteer to join its WEATHER SPOT-TER NETWORK. These citizen volunteers will report severe weather conditions, such as large hail, damaging winds, tornados, etc. directly to NOAA's National Weather Service in Pueblo via a tollfree 800 telephone number or the internet. No special skills or equipment are needed. NOAA's National Weather Service in Pueblo will provide detailed instructions, information and training on

Volunteers are needed all the way from the San Luis Valley and surrounding mountains

to the rural plains of southeast Colorado.

Weather Spotters will continue to be a most important link in NOAA's National Weather

Service severe weather warning process. Information from weather spotters has often allowed for confirmation of severe weather after an official warning has been issued, and occasionally are the first notice that severe weather has developed in an area.

These Weather Spotters would also be asked to report snow amounts in the Winter months. The information these valuable people provide, in some instances, would improve weather forecasts for their area.

Also, if you have wind speed measuring equipment at your home or business, and could share that vital wind information, please contact the National Weather Service in Pueblo. 
